Hello commissioners, staff, and members of the public,

I ask the commission to reject PacifiCorp application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity ("CPCN") for Energy Gateway Segment H, the Boardman-to-Hemingway 500-kilovolt ("kV") transmission line ("B2H" or "Project"). The Company will co-own B2H with Idaho Power Company ("IPC"), which recently filed its own CPCN application for the Project in Case No. IPC-E-23-01.

This transmission line is unneeded for the reasons outline below.

- This transmission line will rely on an inadequate energy from the Mid-C Trading hub in the Pacific Northwest:
- 2. House Concurrent Resolution 4
- I. This transmission line will rely on energy from the Mid-C Trading hub in the Pacific Northwest. The CPCN would enable, Idaho Power the line operator, to export energy from the Mid-C, which is entering a resource inadequacy. The Pacific Northwest Power Supply Adequacy Assessment for 2027 in the Executive Summary in part says¹,

As in the plan, this assessment found risk factors to monitor when determining how to implement and adapt the resource strategy to the wide range of uncertainties the region faces. If regional planners observe increased demand due to accelerated electrification in any part of the region without an associated increase in resources and reserves, and/or resources of significant size are retired without replacement, the risk of adequacy issues increases significantly.

The inadequacy is due to the accelerated retirement of carbon generation resources and a slower replacement of that lost capacity by renewable energy systems. Energy prices will increase due to this resource inadequacy naturally. However, with this additional export of 350+MW energy prices for all Mid-C and Idaho Power customers will increase based on market forces.

Logic would suggest that if Idaho Power built more of their own renewable generation in Idaho, closer to load and enhancing its intrastate transmission/distribution system as it plan to do regardless of this CPCN outcome. It will reduce energy costs in both markets. The IPUC staff in IPC-E-19-14 Application for Power Purchase Sales Agreement with Jackpot Holdings found that the 120 MW PPA with Jackpot was more cost effective than buying energy from the Mid-C (see Exhibit 1, pp. 10-13). If both regions (Idaho and Mid-C) build renewables to

meet their resource inadequacies a new large transmission system will not be needed. The states ability to generate its own energy to meet its needs would give Idaho energy independence and Idaho Powers customers would be less impacted by price inflation. With regional generation and load more in balance the current transmission system can be upgraded, reconducted, and fire hardened for maximum benefits.

II. During the 2023 Idaho Legislative session it passed House Concurrent Resolution 4². The purpose was:

Currently, there is an application pending before the Bureau of Land Management to approve the placement of approximately 400 wind turbines in Jerome, Lincoln, and Minidoka Counties. There has been near unanimous opposition to the project by local governments, including counties and highway districts. The short-term build-out impacts will severely impact the local economy. The long-term impact of the public access, agricultural uses and wildlife are of concern to the citizens of the Magic Valley. This Concurrent resolution will highlight the concerns of the Magic Valley and request the Governor and Attorney General to take what legal actions are available to encourage the BLM to select the no build option³.

This is exactly what the B2H a 300 mile 500 kV transmission line will do to 6 Idaho/Oregon counties. Many of these counties are in Oregon but may soon be a part of Idaho because of House Joint Memorial 1⁴. Its states, "The purpose of this memorial is to authorize the Idaho and Oregon legislatures to begin official discussions on whether it is feasible to move the Idaho border into Eastern Oregon⁵. Many of the Oregonians that are in the Greater Idaho Movement would appreciate your denial of the CPCN as the Idaho legislature stated its lack of support for Lava Ridge and selected the no build option.

I offer below the following modified House Concurrent Resolution 4 using track changes to express what I believe would be the thoughts of the Idaho Legislature in instructing the commission to deny the CPCN based on House Concurrent Resolution 4.
